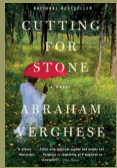

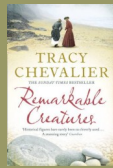

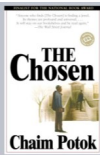
Thursday, February 16 at 10:30 a.m.:

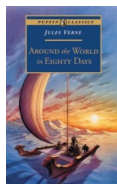

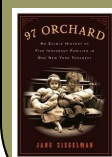
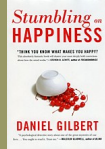
